

General Studies Learning Goals

<u>Exploration of specialty</u> – for the benefit of themselves, their employers, their community and society at large.

<u>Oral and written communication skills</u> - so as to write, speak and listen to achieve intended meaning and understanding.

<u>Information Literacy</u> - so as to have a systematic and disciplined approach to assessing, evaluating and using information.

<u>Computer Literacy</u> - to develop fundamental computer skills for personal and business use.

<u>Quantitative Reasoning and Mathematical Literacy</u> – to analyze real world problems and use resources effectively to identify reasonableness, alternatives, and to select optimal results.

<u>Critical and Creative Thinking Skills</u> to reframe questions, consider multiple perspectives, draw analogies and generate, test and reevaluate outcomes

<u>Cultural Competence</u>- to gain an understanding of their own values, goals and perspectives in order to gain an appreciation of others of similar and diverse cultures, values and perspectives.

<u>Self-analysis skills</u>- to evaluate one's own values, goals, knowledge base, leadership skills, integrity, citizenship and service to others.

<u>Commitment to life-long learning</u>-to encourage students to continue to learn either at school, through transfer to a baccalaureate program or independently.

- 1. Demonstrate a clear connection among elective choices and their personal, occupational or academic ambitions.
- 2. Work with others, including culturally and intellectually diverse peoples; think critically; and gain an appreciation for life-long learning.

- 4. Broaden their knowledge in the areas of Humanities, Social Science, Mathematics and Natural Science
